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HANDBELLS & CHRISTMAS...

Now there's something we've never heard before...oh, wait, yes we have! However, it seems I have more use for Advent music than Christmas music, as my church tends to stick to the lectionary. So I've asked a few director friends to send me their favorites, which are mixed in among mine. And it was interesting to discover we had some picks in common.

Stille Nacht, arr. Betty Garee

As my friend said, "a breathtaking, brilliantly arranged setting of "Silent Night." Some chromatics and triplets could challenge the ringers, but it presents opportunities for music that changes the molecules in the room!"

The Rose Carol, arr. Arnold Sherman

This piece offers a lot of opportunity for musical expression. The melody line is supported with lightly pulsing eighth note patterns and the bass can easily be doubled on chimes for a rich full sound. It's beautiful, flowing and very reflective which makes it a nice church or concert piece.

Change Ring Prelude on "Divinum Mysterium", arr. Fred Gramann

This setting of "Of the Father's Love Begotten" is an excellent introduction to mixed meter, and ranges from ethereal to majestic. Once learned, always enjoyed.

We Three Kings, arr. Arnold Sherman

My ringers always ask to play this. Add the tympani and you can hear the camels swaying across the desert.

Comfort, Comfort Ye My People, arr. Cynthia Dobrinski

Unmetered, but very patterned and learnable. I taught it by rote with clapbacks before they ever saw the music on the page. The rhythmic opening and ending are a contrast with the lyric middle section.

Mary's Cradle Song, arr. Karen Lakey Buckwalter

A beautiful music box setting of the traditional Austrian carol with optional flute.

I Wonder As I Wander, arr. Fred Gramann

It's Fred Gramann, so of course, there's more than one tune. He intersperses "We Three Kings" with the haunting title tune, and it invokes the vision of the Star over Bethlehem.

Ding! Dong! Merrily on High, arr. Eithun

One of my favorite carols fantastically balanced between bell choir and flute. Both flute and choir act as dance partners. The whole piece is a well-executed duet not just a bell choir/instrument duel.

God With Us for All Time, arr. Garee

An oldie but a goodie. Christmas music should be a mix of mystery and majesty and this piece does both exceptionally well.

African Noel, arr. Moklebust

An "out of the box" selection for advanced choirs, with lots of changing rhythms meaning the choir is **never** bored.

Variations on 'People Look East,' arr. Helman

Advent tunes usually get short shrift but *People Look East* is a gem. Helman's settings are fun, challenging and exciting for choir and congregation alike.

I know one of our favorite pieces for Christmas is **Now the Green Blade, arr. Kevin McChesney**, which was pretty fun for us! Our bell group has played this piece off and on for a number of years. This piece brings feelings of intrigue, excitement, and expectation. It provides a variety of techniques: mallets, marts, accenting in rhythmic places. Fun things!

Another piece that we like is **Fred Gramann's Carol of the Wise Men**. This piece takes you to the desert! It is truly fun to ring and fun to imagine. We also like having a soloist. We even like doing it in January when people think Christmas is over! This is very beautiful, musically, and has a meaningful text.

It Came Upon A Midnight Clear, arr. Arnold Sherman

I love this arrangement because it has a lush sound with interesting chordal structures. It includes chimes in the beginning and end, plus some tower swinging. Beautiful arrangement.

CHRISTMAS FAVORITES IN JULY!

We took a poll on the Kansas Handbell Musicians of America Facebook page asking "What's your favorite Christmas handbell piece?" The response was that most people really like the standards: **Carol of the Bells; Silent Night; Little Drummer Boy; O Holy Night** and **In the Bleak Midwinter**.

Carol of the Bells The piece was written in 1916 by Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovich and titled "Shchedryk." The song tells the tale of a swallow flying into a household to proclaim the plentiful year the family will have. The song's title is from the Ukrainian word "shchedryj," which means "bountiful." There are many arrangements of this piece, with at least nine titled **Carol of the Bells**.

Silent Night In 1816 Joseph Mohr created the poem. In 1818 on Christmas Eve, Franz Xaver Gruber composed a melody to fit the text. *Silent Night! Holy Night!* has its world premiere that night in the St. Nicholas church of Oberndorf near Salzburg Austria, performed by Franz Xaver Gruber and Joseph Mohr. There are more than twenty arrangements titled *Silent Night*.

Little Drummer Boy Originally titled *Carol of the Drum,* this song was written in 1941 by pianist Katherine K. Davis. It's based on a traditional Czech carol. There aren't as many arrangements of this piece as you might think.

O Holy Night In 1847, mayor, wine merchant and an occasional poet, Placide Cappeau was asked by a parish priest to write a poem for Christmas mass. Cappeau decided that his *Cantique de Noel* was not just a poem, but a song in need of music. He asked his friend Adolphe Charles Adams to write the music. There are over 20 pieces titled *O Holy Night*.

In the Bleak Midwinter This piece was written by Christina Rossetti as a Christmas poem for an American magazine, Scribner's Monthly, in 1872. She authored three collections of mostly religious poetry and four devotional books. She also wrote *Love Came Down at Christmas*.

These pieces have a fascinating history. On the Kansas website <u>www.agehr-ks.org</u> I've added some more information about these and other Christmas pieces. I hope you will go to the website and read more.

Christmas in July also happens at Handbell Camp in Parkville, MO. Kansans organize this event so check out <u>www.handbellcamp.org</u> for more information.

CHRISTMAS FAVORITES

Everyone loves bells at Christmas! It is a blessing to bring so much joy to others with the carols and wonderful music of Christmas. Over the years my adult choir has built up a repertoire of favorites we like to use for caroling. Our "golden oldies" include several **Cynthia Dobrinski** arrangements: **Ding Dong! Merrily On High!**, **White Christmas**, **Silver Bells**, **I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day**, and **Jingle Bells** (bring children up from the audience to play sleigh bells). Audiences love to sing along with **Doug Wagner's** series of four **Christmas Carol Fests** published by Agape. Each of the four is a straightforward arrangement of several familiar carols which can be rung alone or invite audience participation. We like Doug's **Let It Snow! Let It Snow! Let It Snow!**, and his charming **Frosty the Snowman** ends with a malleted coda that sparkles. Put a child in a snowman costume to dance around the audience and everyone is delighted. Other favorites include **William E. Gross's A Nativity Celebration**, **Hart Morris's West Indies Carol** with percussion, **Joel Raney's We Three Kings**, a transcription of the choral classic **Carol of the Bells** by **Richard Litterst**, and our favorite concert opener, **McChesney's Now the Green Blade Riseth**. To these we add the repertoire from the current season.

I always need new processionals. My choirs love to ring and sing. I enjoy **Dobrinski's** easily memorized 3-octave **Seasonal Procession** from Agape, with two different sung texts for Christmas and Easter. This year we used **Hart Morris's On This Day Earth Shall Ring** from CPH, which sounds quite medieval with muffled snare drum and finger cymbals. Nutcracker arrangements are always a hit at Christmas. We have used **Griffin's** transcription of **Dance of the Reed Flutes** from Flammer, his arrangement of **Marche** from *The Nutcracker Suite* from AGEHR, **Ardis Freeman's Dance of the Sugarplum Fairy** from Cantabile Press, **Doug Wagner's Trepak** from Agape, and **McChesney's Arab Dance** from Jeffers Handbell.

More advanced choirs would enjoy several Christmas selections that have been rung at Distinctly Bronze in recent years. These include **Moklebust's** dramatic **Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence** in the Raleigh Ringers Series from Jeffers Handbell, **Sherman's** fun level 5 setting of **Up On the Housetop** from Agape, **Moklebust's** haunting level 4 **Greensleeves** with hand percussion, and **Raney's** ethereal **Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming** with synthesizer and percussion. Catholic and Episcopal churches where Annunciation Sunday is observed know the hymn, **The Angel Gabriel from Heaven Came**. My Episcopal friend from Cleveland was thrilled when Distinctly Bronze rang **Raney's** setting of that hymn from Agape with synthesizer and percussion. It is a great concert piece. Another great level 4 piece is **Brian Childer's Dreamscape on 'Still, Still, Still'** from Alfred, with flute and percussion. The Area 8 festival in 2000 at Topeka used **Hart Morris's** Level 4 **Las Campanas de la Navidad** from Alfred; the marimba, guitar, percussion, and malleted bass bells give it a wonderful Spanish flavor.

What a privilege we have to share such wonderful music with our ringers and audiences!

NEBRASKA CHRISTMAS FAVORITES

Our task this month is to present a list of our favorite Christmas handbell selections. I have included a few of my own favorites as well as some from my state committee.

Come, Emmanuel, arr. Matthew Prins

A medley of three pieces, characterized by the use of numerous mallet techniques throughout, giving it a sort of mystical feel. A mesmerizing arrangement guaranteed to keep your audience's attention.

The First Noel, arr. Cathy Moklebust

This was written for the Raleigh Ringers Series, but is accessible for intermediate choirs. Truly a beautiful piece.

Change Ring Prelude on "Divinum Mysterium," arr. Fred Gramann

A beautiful arrangement for use during Advent or Epiphany.

2 Christmas Carols, arr. Paul McKlveen

This is actually two separate pieces, *Stille Nacht* and an original composition, *Christmas Lullaby*. These have been masterfully arranged to fully recreate Chip Davis' original arrangements, and they sound spectacular on handbells. I even arranged a synthesizer part to fill in the violin, the vocals and the wind effects. You will definitely get a great reaction from your listeners.

Traditions of Christmas, arr. Paul McKlveen

This has been a perennial favorite and again, sounds terrific when played on handbells.

Were You There On That Christmas Night, arr. Martha Lynn Thompson

This is an emotional piece for Christmas and is fast becoming a popular favorite in the bell world.

Mary Did You Know, arr. Douglas Wagner

Consider using this with your SATB choir which makes for a wonderful joint presentation. I have done this with bells and a joint vocal choir and it is stunning in its impact on the listeners.

On A Still and Silent Night, arr. M. Akers

Accessible and musically satisfying for ringers of all ages. It is a clever combination of *Still, Still, Still* and *Silent Night*. It is a powerful piece for a Christmas Eve Candlelight service.

I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day, arr. Cynthia Dobrinski

We often have played this as a memorable anthem and it truly displays the power of bells on Christmas.

Not many instruments seem so perfect for the Christmas season as do handbells. Consider the above selections along with the others in this issue and make your next Christmas season spectacular. Not only in your church, but why not put together a concert and present it to the entire community. You will be glad you did and so will your listeners!
