ELECTED OFFICERS

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BELLS DON'T NEED TUNING...

...but directors do! What better way to "tune-up" your directing skills than to attend a workshop just for directors? The Illinois State Committee is planning a fun day that will hone your directing skills and increase your handbell knowledge.

The day will have a maximum of 40 registrants to keep classes small and give you lots of hands on time with the handbells. The morning will consist of class sessions that will include:

- Exercises & Skills Development: Get resources for teaching technique and skills, such as eighth notes and easy bell changes, and a second session on more advanced topics such as articulations and weaving.
- Teaching Beginning Bells: Suggestions for welcoming the new ringer, teaching them the basics, and integrating them into your ensemble.
- Level System & Bell Assignments: Discussion of the AGEHR graded level system for handbell music and different handbell assignment methods.
- Conducting: A review of the basics, including beat patterns and cueing, and a second session for an introduction to more complicated issues, including mixed meter and articulations.
- Stopped Sounds & More: Hands on review of all articulations, techniques, and notations.
- Round Table Discussion: Bring your questions! You will have a chance to share your situations and solutions.
- Children's Handbell Ensembles: How to get started and a list of resources and considerations.

In the afternoon, we will have a "Read and Ring" session to sight-read through a number of selections of varying difficulty. It is very important that ALL directors get behind the table every once in a while, and this session will give you a practical review and demonstration of the morning topics.

Look for a postcard in your mailbox this spring about "Tune-up! A Workshop for Directors" to be held on a Saturday (or two) this summer. If you are interested in hosting such an event at the place you direct, please email me and let me know!

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DO YOU HAVE A DIRECTOR QUESTION?

As a director, have you ever wished you had someone to answer your handbell question? Hopefully all directors know that your state and area representatives are here to help you out. In lowa, we try at every event to offer something to help directors learn and grow. We usually offer classes with every workshop. For example: *Bell Basics*, *Bass Bells*, *4-in-hand* and *Solo/Ensemble*. Even at our Youth Ringers Event we plan to have a round table discussion to give directors some time to share ideas and answer questions.

The hardest part for your state committee is that we don't know what you are seeking. Are you a person who wants help directing? Or maybe you are a person who was given bells and told to make music with them and have no prior experience? I personally find that I learn quite a bit more from standing on the ringing side of the table and spending my time *doing* so that I can go home and teach my ringers. For instance, when trying to teach 4-in-hand, I believe it is easier to teach if you have actually had to put the bells in your hands first, rather than just learning from reading a book.

Most importantly, if you are a director and have a question or need to know where to find an answer, you need to ask. Let your state and area representatives know what you want. That is one of the perks of being a member of AGEHR. Your state and area representatives are here to help and if they cannot answer the question, I would bet they know somewhat who can.

Let us know how we can help you, we are waiting.

ARE YOU A POTENTIAL DIRECTOR?

I have a theory about handbell ringers. I have never been able to prove my theory, but the more I speak with ringers and directors, the more convinced I am about this theory.

Theory: Every handbell ringer is a potential handbell director.

As recently as this morning just before finalizing this article, I received an email from a brand new director who had moved from the ringing side of the table to the director's stand. Why is a ringer a potential director? The jargon, the execution, and the ringing ensemble itself are unique features of handbells.

- The jargon: unless the director completely understands terminology like swing, shake, thumb damp, and martellato, the director is at a tremendous disadvantage in directing a handbell ensemble!
- The execution: many of the above mentioned articulations are unique to the handbell ringing art. I have never heard of an orchestral instrument executing a thumb damp, or a martellato. Directors must know the instrument and how to teach the execution of a myriad of techniques and articulations.
- A person who has some time-keeping abilities (rhythm skills), who also has some adeptness at conducting (moving their arms), and who has a keen ear for correcting errant notes can be an okay director of handbells. But what is missing is the particular knowledge of the instrument!

Consider this idea about handbells—handbells is the only single instrument that is played by many people! A set of handbells is one instrument, no matter how many octaves—usually, played by an ensemble of personnel consisting of from 4 - 15 people. Many people playing one instrument. This uniqueness was made apparent to me several years ago while attending a National Seminar. The virtuosic group Ring of Fire had performed an impeccable concert. At the luncheon following there was a grand piano over in the corner of the hall. Their director Jason Wells invited his ringers to move to the piano. Some of the ringers sat on the floor, some leaned over others, and some could barely fit their fingers on the piano keyboard. But with precision and musicality they played a piece from their concert on the piano. Now 13-15 people playing a single piano seems a bit bizarre! However, it brought the point home to me—that many people are required to play the *single* instrument of handbells.

So every handbell ringer who has been taught the jargon, knows how to execute the articulations, and knows about a ringing ensemble, IS a potential handbell director.

How can a motivated ringer move from behind the table to the director's stand and learn the craft of conducting handbells? The simple answer is *by attending a director's seminar!* See you at the next seminar!

THROW A PARTY!!

- ~Seasonal parties, welcome back in the fall parties, we-just-ranga-great-concert parties...are a great time for fellowship and to let your ringers know how much you appreciate them!
- ~Kids love pajama parties!! Have everyone wear their jammies, pop some popcorn, and watch the video of their latest performance everyone has fun and it's a great time to see what we're doing well and what we need to work on.
- ~For the adults, a progressive party is fun, or even just a group outing after rehearsal. Anytime you can bring fellowship opportunities into the group, everyone benefits.

CELEBRATE SPECIAL OCCASIONS

- ~Remember your group members' birthdays with a card and letting the group sing to them.
- ~Kids love having a special game they get to play at the end of rehearsal when there is a birthday, let the birthday child start the game (or pick the game.)
- ~Can't give up enough rehearsal time for a party during a holiday? Even your adults will enjoy finding a little *treat* waiting for them when they get to rehearsal. Whether it's a small bell ornament or a piece of candy, you are letting your ringers know they are special.



- ~If you are a church-affiliated group, your rehearsals should allow for time to share joys, concerns, and prayer requests; and to pray together as a group.
- ~Be sure to follow up on specific prayer requests. Keep your members in your prayers, and then check back with them if the situation allows (for example, if someone asks for prayers for a sick family member).
- ~Give your members a call, drop them a note, or even shoot an email just to let them know you are thinking about them and that you continue to keep them in your prayers.

Dinner Bell Recipe

Beef & Black-Eyed Pea Soup

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2 lbs ground beef 1 c celery, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped 2 T beef bouillon granules

1/2 c butter1 T pepper1/2 c flour1/2 t salt

8 c water 1/4 t garlic power 16 oz frozen black-eyed peas 1/4 t onion powder 1 onion, chopped 1 1/2 c prepared rice

8 oz frozen diced carrots

Brown beef and green pepper in skillet; drain. Melt butter in a Dutch oven; add flour, whisking until smooth. Cook one minute, stirring constantly. Gradually add water; stir until bubbly. Stir in beef mixture and all remaining ingredients, except rice. Bring to boil; cover and simmer 45 minutes to one hour. Add rice during the last 15 minutes. Serves 6-8
