### Hymn Accompaniments

Hymn accompaniments can take several forms: use of handbells in lieu of keyboard, the addition of handbells to keyboard accompaniment, or a combination of the first two. The following is a far from exhaustive list of materials available for your use.

- From the Top Music (www.fromthetopmusic.com) presents a wide range of hymn accompaniments for 2-5 octave groups in the same key as your hymnal! The music is sent to you as a PDF file with permission to copy.
- Lutheran Church of Prayer (<u>www.lcop.org/handbellsdownloads.html</u>) offers a number of free versions of Lutheran hymns arranged for bells alone and bells and organ.
- Festive Hymn Accompaniments for Handbells by Bob Burroughs (Lorenz) was designed to allow ringers to take a uniquely active role in the worship experience. Each hymn tune includes an optional introduction, along with scorings to be played with congregation and organ on the first and last stanzas.
- Maggie Tucker and Choristers Guild have published Harmonies for Hymns, Chords for Carols and Christmas Carol Accompaniments. These contain easy chordal accompaniments plus melody lines for instruments or solo voice. These arrangements are also useful as accompaniments for congregational or other group singing, with or without organ or piano.
- Hope Publishing's works by Hal Hopson (The Creative Use of Handbells in Worship—2 volumes and More Creative Ways to Use the Choir, Organ, Handbells, and Other Instruments in Worship) contain a wealth of options for many hymns covering one to many bells, including random rings.
- In *Flexible Hymn Accompaniments 1 & 2* from Morning Star Music, Sondra Tucker presents settings of five familiar hymns, arranged for organ and 3-5 octaves of handbells. Each tune contains an introduction or interlude, a traditional and an alternate harmonization. Instrumental duet and vocal descant parts are included as an added bonus.
- Phil Roberts' GIA series *Hymns for Handbells* encompasses three volumes, with each presenting multiple versions of 10 plus hymns. The versions vary in difficulty, and can be played by 2-5 octaves of handbells.
- Lloyd Larsen offers the Hymn Enhancement series *Hymns for* \_\_\_\_\_ covering Christmas, Easter, Thanksgiving, and worship. The Lorenz series offers choral introits and/or codas to familiar hymns, and includes optional brass and handbell parts.
- Easter Accompaniments, Peals, and Processionals by David Sanders (World Library Publications) contains 14 arrangements of seven Easter hymns. Most settings are included in the 3 octave range. These pieces are not meant to be played alone, but are a good way to include bells in the Easter service without a great deal of preparation.
- Lee Afdahl has prepared Hymn Accompaniments for Handbells Advent and Christmas (Augsburg Fortress), a reproducible collection of 3-5 octave settings that make it easy to integrate handbells into worship during Advent, Christmas and Epiphany. Each hymn selection features an introduction to the hymn and a setting for the final stanza.

## Psalms and Introits

For this article I have begged for help from my **awesome** lowa committee. Many thanks to Laurie Stock, Yvonne Johnson, and MaryLee Parks!

### Laurie:

The only Psalm piece we have used was *Psalm Nine* by Carl Wiltse (AG3053). It was a festival piece several years ago. I believe it's written in 3/4 time and has a haunting sound. When I researched "Psalm," I found:

"The word psalm comes from the Greek word, *psalmoi*, a song sung to a harp, originally derived from *psallein*, to play on a stringed instrument. The Book of Psalms consists of 150 of these lyrical poems. The main characteristic of this Hebrew poetic form is parallelism, a balanced thought usually presented in two parts. The first part states a thesis and the second part reflects the thesis, usually in one of three ways: repeating the idea, adding to the idea, or opposing the idea." <a href="http://psalmspeak.wordpress.com/tag/psalmspeak/page/2/">http://psalmspeak.wordpress.com/tag/psalmspeak/page/2/</a>

### Yvonne:

I have used some things from *After the Prelude—Handbell Resources to Enhance Worship* by William H. Mathis (CGB659, CGB586, CGB617). It is kind of expensive and is written for liturgical years A, B, and C. In Year A, he has *Advent Candle Song*, *Processional for Advent*, bell parts for *On Jordan's Bank* and *People*, *Look East*, Christmas Eve scripture: John 1:1-15, *Christmas Processional*, bell parts for *Angels We Have Heard on High*, *Go*, *Tell It on the Mountain*, *In the Bleak Midwinter*, *Joy to the World*, *Once in Royal David's City*, and *'Twas in the Moon of Wintertime*. We enjoyed adding bells to Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32, the parable of the Prodigal Son. We have also used: *The Shepherd's Psalm* by J. Wayne Kerr (3-5 octaves, flute, narrator, CGB116). After lighting the Advent candle we have played *Come*, *Lord Jesus*, *We are Waiting*, Dorothy Christopherson (CGA592). I use *Vocal Descants for the Church Year* (ISBN 9780800679439) with my Recorder Consort, and think this would work well with bells.

### MaryLee:

We don't!

This is, by far, my favorite response from my committee, as I also confess that my bell choir usually only plays the prelude. Folks, if this works for your church, IT'S OK! Part of your job as a music minister is to provide God's people with a decoration of God's word. If the best thing that works well is for your choir to ring the prelude, that's what they should be doing! Please consider the **wonderful** suggestions by my committee, but also know that what you are doing already is **important**. Great bell repertoire played really well makes a wonderful prelude for worship and provides wonderful decoration for the word. As William Mathis (mentioned above) says, "there are lots of ways to do this right!"

## Remembrance and All Saints

A ringing or tolling bell has long been a symbol of remembrance and celebration. Bells toll on Christmas morning. They ring at weddings and funerals and to signal the opening of the Olympic Games.

All Saints and other times of remembrance in the church and community setting are afforded a number of pieces including: For All The Saints (CGB356/357); Resounding Alleluias (CGB559); Ring Around The Year (CGB759); Song of Remembrance (Hope 1697).

Full scores of music are wonderful and emotional, but many times a single bell accompanying a prayer, poem or memory will imbue the perfect setting for a somber, reflecting service/celebration. The example that follows is taken from the *Jewish Prayer Book*.

### We Remember Them

At the rising of the sun and at its going down—We remember them. (Ring G#4)

At the blowing of the wind and the chill of winter—We remember them. (Ring D#4)

At the opening of the buds and in the rebirth of spring—We remember them. (Ring G#5)

At the blueness of the skies and in the warmth of summer—We remember them. (Ring A#5)

At the rustling of the leaves and in the beauty of autumn—We remember them. (Ring D#4)

At the beginning of the year and when it ends—We remember them. (Ring C#5)

When we are weary and in need of strength—We remember them. (Ring C#6)

When we are lost and sick at heart—We remember them. (Ring D#6)

When we have joys and celebrations we yearn to share—We remember them. (Ring A#4)

So long as we live, they too will live; for they are now a part of us—We remember them.

(possibly say a name before or after each bell is rung)

All bells random ring. At cue Re-Strike G#4 and let it fade.

This may also be done with special memories; state the memory, then the common statement ("Thanks be to God" or "We remember them" or "The Lord be with you"), then ring the bell.

These examples can all be done as simply as the same bell after each statement (D#4 has a very mellow tone) or even bells to make a chord (G, B, D). Experiment with bells to hear what sounds best for your service.

## In Memoriam

From my own experience, our initial 2-octave set of handbells was a result of a purchase using memorial funds following the death of my mother. And when my father passed away, four years later, my sisters and I decided to include a handbell number in his funeral. He had always been a huge fan of the venerable hymn, *Holy, Holy, Holy.* We didn't have the piece in our handbell music library, so I did a handbell arrangement of the hymn that we could put together quickly for his funeral. Despite the probably less than professional arrangement I put together, the piece was a success primarily because of the setting and the wishes of my father.

Since that time, I have come across a number of pieces that are appropriate for use in funerals and memorial services, such as:

- I Will Arise and Go To Jesus L 2, for 2-5 octaves with optional handchimes and percussion. A memorial piece composed by Cathy Moklebust in memory of past Guild president and American handbell pioneer, Nebraska's Mary Kettelhut. A beautiful and accessible piece for all choirs and ideal for any funeral. The piece creates a feeling of joy for the listeners and portrays a sense of loved ones going to meet Jesus. www.handbellworld.com/music/MusicPiece.cfm?piece=14675
- Make Me An Instrument Composed by Kevin McChesney, L 2+, 3-5 octaves with optional keyboard, brass ensemble and C instrument. This is a remarkable piece commissioned in memory of the school shootings at Columbine High School and a portion of the proceeds from the sale of this music goes to help combat school violence. A very powerful piece guaranteed to elicit an emotional response. www.handbellworld.com/music/ MusicPiece.cfm?piece=8738
- Grazioso An original piece by Arnold Sherman that evokes a strong feeling of life, illness, death and resurrection. L 2+, for 3-5 octaves. This is a classic handbell composition and never fails to rouse a feeling of awe and reverence from the listeners. www.handbellworld.com/music/MusicPiece.cfm?piece=8587
- Hymn Of Promise by Natalie Sleeth / arr. Cynthia Dobrinski, L 2+, 3-6 octaves handbells and optional handchimes. The metaphorical text of this piece makes reference to our resurrection, so it is a wonderful piece for any memorial or funeral service. www.handbellworld.com/music/MusicPiece.cfm?piece=13989
- As The Deer Nystrom / arr. Susan Geschke L 2+, for 3-5 octaves and 3-octaves of chimes. This is a new arrangement of the classic song arranged as a memorial to a young soldier who gave his life to his country while serving in Iraq. A very nice piece for any funeral or memorial service. www.handbellworld.com/music/MusicPiece.cfm?piece=12725
- The Lord's Prayer A. Malotte / arr. by Cynthia Dobrinski, Medium difficulty for 3-5 octaves
  of handbells. This is a full arrangement of the immortal Malotte piece which is a memorable number for any funeral or memorial service. www.handbellworld.com/music/

These pieces represent only the tip of the iceberg of available music appropriate for funerals and memorial services. Without a doubt, handbells and handchimes provide a nice alternative or addition to the more traditional instrumentation for funerals or memorials services, so consider their inclusion into the services when families discuss music options for services for their loved ones. They will be surprisingly pleased by the welcome sounds these instruments will provide.
