

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welcome to music symbol sudoku

The Rules

Like the familiar number version, the rules for solving these puzzles are simple:

Put one-and only one-of the symbols shown below in:

- each row
- each column
- each 3 x 3 box that's within the bigger grid

The symbols that you'll use are: \mathbf{o}

The a, b, c's

While the rules may be simple, that doesn't always mean that the puzzles are. For maximum flexibility of use, each of the 29 puzzles in *Music Symbol Sudoku* is offered in an A, B and C version. The solution for all the versions is the same, but more symbols are supplied in the A version, making it the easiest (comparable to a one- or two-star "regular" puzzle). B is a little more difficult (three-star) and C is the most difficult of the three (four-star).

Because the puzzles are formatted this way, you may reproduce the page, cut out the individual puzzles, and distribute different levels of the same puzzle within the same class. This allows all students to experience success together. If you need an easier version, reproduce the puzzle and fill in even more "answers" in the A version. Once you have a puzzle that is the right level for your students, simply copy it.

the symbols


For even the most savvy sudoku puzzlers, the use of music symbols will likely pose a new challenge. We recommend having a sheet of the nine symbols nearby as you work. If you're using these puzzles in the classroom, you may reproduce page 3 and cut out and distribute the symbol banner that runs along the top, or you could write the symbols on the board. You could also have students create their own symbol strip—it's a great notation exercise!

extension

Recreate any of the puzzles in the book with a new set of symbols. First, reproduce the blank grid on page 3. Then, pick a puzzle and replace its original symbols with the corresponding symbols from a new set. A few suggested sets to get you started are offered below. Create your own set to reinforce the symbols the students are learning, or work with students to create a "class set."
