

The Iowa Committee is looking forward to presenting two events this fall season, both featuring clinician Brenda Austin. She is conductor of the Detroit Handbell Ensemble, a prolific composer, a dynamic music educator, and is most recently the Handbell Editor at Hope/Agape publishing.

Friday, October 9 - Beer, Wine, and Bells will feature beverages and heavy hors d'oeuvres provided by Des Moines Concert Handbells, and a reading session featuring tried, true, and new pieces for your handbell program.

Saturday, October 10 - 2020 Mid-lowa Handbell Festival with Brenda Austin. This day-long festival brings together 80-100 of your handbell colleagues from central Iowa and will culminate in a public performance of five pieces.

## Notes from Kansas

Kipp wrote a compelling article about the need for borrowing multiple octaves of handbells and handchimes, plus foam and other equipment, to be loaned for use at the Area 8 Festival. However, since the Area 8 Festival will not take place, we will not need your equipment in June. Kipp has been in charge of procuring this equipment for many state, area, and national events, and he has always come through with everything that was needed.

The success of most handbell events depends on the use of loaned equipment. We (meaning you) need handbells, chimes, foam pads, bell trees, music stands, mallets, boom boxes, and more, in order for every attendee to get the full impact of a handbell event. Loaned equipment is needed for almost every classroom and reading session room, and Area 8 uses borrowed bells for BronzeFest and YouthFest choirs. The handbell world is close-knit and very generous with equipment loans. Every class I've attended had enough bells, foam, and other equipment so that we can perfect our skills and learn new techniques.

Our best and most important asset in the handbell world is the sense of community that we build when we gather. The networking and friendmaking that takes place as we learn and ring side by side allows us to create a sense of family. We know how precious our equipment is to us and others, which in turn reminds us to treat each handbell and handchime with utmost respect, as if it were our very own.

When any of you receives the call to loan equipment for a handbell event, please be prepared to say yes. Chances are, you have rung equipment owned by someone else, and the knowledge and experience you take home has been enhanced by handbells that were borrowed. If my handbells could talk, I would love to hear who, and how many, have rung them at handbell events. And if we could list the owners of all the sets of handbells we have rung, I imagine our "degrees of separation" would be much less than 10!

Thank you, Kipp, for saying "yes" to finding equipment for the 2020 Area 8 Festival. I had been looking forward to walking through all the classrooms and rehearsal spaces, looking at all those beautiful handbells and handchimes. I am confident we will gather again soon and make beautiful music with "owned and loaned" handbells and handchimes.

## And then there was the virus...

As if preparations for the Area 8 Festival were not enough, we have the virus, eliminating in person rehearsals for the near future. A few weeks ago the members of our choir did the unthinkable, they took home their individual bells, gloves, music and mallets. This makes the director very nervous, but it was the best way to keep on practicing. Of course there is the "spoon method," but really nothing feels like a bell.

We have been meeting electronically with the help of Zoom. There are issues, the main one being the delay in sound so that we cannot really play together. After trying several options, this is what we decided works the best. Everyone mutes his or her microphone except for the director. The director plays the recorded music, courtesy of the Jeffers Handbell Supply website, on the smartphone, which can be hooked up to a speaker. The director then counts out the measures while the ringers ring. The ringers

are playing up to tempo and not getting lost. Of course the director ... it does allow everyone cannot hear anyone playing, so she or he is happy too, thinking everyone is playing well. Seriously, this does not in any way take the place of a real rehearsal, but it

does allow everyone to be immersed in the music, and it is better than no rehearsal at all. The ringers know that they need to practice between group rehearsals, or they will be lost, and so the whole choir gains.

If you use Zoom for free, then there is a forty-minute limit per session. You could either pay a monthly fee for more benefits or string together more sessions. There are other on-line services as well, and there may be more benefits with other services. In the meantime, we will be continuing with our virtual practices. Another benefit of the stay-at-home orders is that we have had perfect attendance at our rehearsals.

- 1. Get on the Handbell Musicians of America website---explore the articles and the information that is there, take notes on ways you can improve your rehearsals and ringing. If you have not yet paid your dues to the guild, please do. There is so much that this organization can offer!
- 2. In the same vein, if you aren't already a part of such a group on Facebook, consider joining Handbell-L or Handbell People. There are always great questions, discussions, suggestions, and videos of choirs.
- 3. Listen to the CDs that are sent by the various publishers. Pick out your repertoire for the next season (yes, this season is probably pretty well over!)
- 4. Get your music order in, so the music is ready to go when we can get together again.
- 5. Reorganize your folders. Take out the music from last year and file them. Once you get you your new music in, get it in the folders.
- 6. If you can get into your church to where your bells are, take the time to check springs, readjust the clappers, polish the bells, and check for parts that may need to be replaced.
- 7. Make an effort to contact all of your ringers. An email to the choir, a ZOOM meeting, or, to me as most important, give each one a personal connection. Text, message on Facebook, even call!! Catch up on feelings over the past few weeks and let them know that they are an important part of your life!

Instead of looking back at what we lost, look forward with anticipation to a new season of ringing and enjoying our special friendships!
