Byron Jensen, Chair Elect



Byron Jensen's introduction to handbells began when he was appointed assistant professor of music at Ottawa University (OU Kansas) in 1990. Having no prior experience, his department chair contacted Judy Anderson in Topeka who attended a couple of handbell rehearsals, introduced him to Cynthia Dobrinski's Rondo Passacaglia, and the rest is history. During Dr. Jensen's thirteen years at Ottawa, the OU

Ringers toured annually with the Choir and performed across the United States. The OU Ringers were twice invited to the Kansas Music Educators Conference in Wichita. He also directed handbells at Westminster Presbyterian Church where his spouse (Deb) and their children (Hannah and Nathan) were introduced to handbells.

In 2003, Dr. Jensen accepted an appointment at Hastings College (Nebraska) where he founded the HC Handbell Choir (HCHC). He immediately began conducting handbells at First Presbyterian Church where he was met with Petit-Fritzen (PF) handbells. A year later Hastings College purchased five octaves of bells, chimes and requisite equipment, and has since added several bass bells and chimes. As conductor and artistic director of the Hastings Symphony Orchestra (HSO) since 2004, Dr. Jensen connected with Kevin McChesney to lead a Nebraska Committee handbell workshop in Hastings, and have the Pikes Peak Ringers perform "Ring of Fire" with the HSO.

HCHC has toured extensively in Nebraska and Colorado; invited twice to perform at the Nebraska Music Educators conference where they also presented a session on handbells in the music classroom; performed for the Nebraska Handbell Committee workshop (Kevin McChesney, guest conductor); the Area 11 Spring Ring in Loveland, CO (Michael Joy, guest conductor); and have appeared four times with the HSO for Christmas concerts. Dr. Jensen has commissioned four handbell pieces on behalf of HCHC, of which three are currently in print. Dr. Jensen has attended Area 8 Festivals, including driving the U-Haul that collected several sets of handbells and delivered them to Omaha. He has served on the Nebraska Committee for many years, and is presently the recording secretary.

In his 43-year career as an educator and conductor, Dr. Jensen has served in administrative positions and committee appointments, and has been involved with academic development. He is retiring from Hastings College this May with plans to remain involved in handbells, including revisiting selections he has composed/arranged, but never had time to complete.

What started as a, "I'll be conducting what!?!" thought in his 1990 interview at Ottawa University, became a journey to include his family, friends, church ringers, hundreds of middle/high school through college students, and enthused handbell colleagues and composers.

Amy Knudsen, Treasurer



Hi! My name is Amy Knudsen. I would be honored to serve as the Area 8 Treasurer for the next two years. Here's a little bit about me:

I came into handbells late. I was a counselor at a high school music camp, and one of the area church handbell directors brought in his

four octave bells as a class. I volunteered to play and was hooked; even after tower swinging directly into a glass door of a stereo! (Nothing broke, but the director did cringe.)

After college, my husband and I moved to an area where the church I joined had a three octave choir needing ringers. After about six months, we moved to Kansas.

Again, the church I joined had four octaves of handbells, but they had no director. I volunteered and started by jumping in with both feet. I'm seriously not sure how we survived that first year, but after attending the Area 8 conference in St. Charles the next summer, I came back with lots of 'fixes' and ideas. We made it, and slowly became ringers. After eleven years, I had to step back from the handbells as I had two very active girls in junior high and high school. I was a competition dance mom, a marching band uniform chair for three years and helped plan the after-graduation parties for each year.

I subbed in the Southminster Presbyterian Church choir when they needed me, eventually becoming a full-time ringer. In 2019, I auditioned and made the Lawrence Community Handbell Choir and had one cycle of concerts before COVID. We continued to meet every now and then to keep up our skills, and started full time again this fall.

I have worked for Wendi with Third Bell on the Right, so I've traveled to the past two national conferences and other area conferences. One recent highlight was playing with our nerf guns in Phoenix during the mass ringing sessions. We even got Christine Anderson and Nikki Evans to play with us. (Carol Scheel with Heitz Handbells is incredibly sneaky.)

When not performing in handbells, I play the bassoon in The Kansas City Wind Symphony and the American Legion Band of Greater Kansas City. I also have been the personnel manager for the KCWS since 2014. On weekends, I can also be found playing with our two rescue dogs, reading or cleaning up the acreage we purchased in July of 2020.

varying speeds with various rhythm combinations. I think this is a great and fun way to start improving rhythmic skills. This can even be done without the use of handbells if you don't have access to them!

Solos/Small Ensembles

If you have bells of your own or are able to borrow bells from a group you ring with regularly, the summer is a great time to dive into trying out solo ringing or small ensemble ringing. If you've ever been on the fence about trying it, taking the time to do so when you don't have other handbell rehearsals or engagements can not only keep you engaged with bell ringing, but can also help build any skills you've been wanting to work on!

Handbell Videos

Okay, so this one may be a little less hands-on, BUT sometimes it's nice to give our hands, wrists, and arms a little break from physical ringing. You can still mentally engage with handbell material by watching old recorded concerts, instructional videos (even if you don't have bells to practice with on your own), or watching some fun and creative videos by Bruna Marinho on YouTube and Facebook.

Music Educators, Take Note! Nancy Youngman, Nebraska Chair

Are you a music educator? Are you a person who is always looking for ways to engage the students, add fun to your lessons, and enhance your curriculum? If you answered "yes" to any of those questions, I definitely have the program for you!!

Over 20 years ago, the Chime Loan Program was started to promote the use of chimes in schools. Malmark furnishes a 3 octave set of chimes to each state for a reduced cost with the idea of loaning these chimes to schools for a semester or year. At the end of the term, the school has the option of purchasing the set they used. Seven years ago, Area 8 began the task of replacing each state's set of chimes with a brand new set, as the original sets were aging. At this point, every state has a new set of chimes. With the pandemic, several still have not been used. Please contact your state representative for an opportunity to use these!! (Those representatives are listed on the right.)

How can you use them? I actually used a set for a year with 6th grade exploratory music classes. The students loved them so much, the school purchased a set! Each state also furnishes a set of resources to be used along with the chimes, but the sky's the limit on usage, along with your imagination!!

One excellent teacher in Nebraska used the chimes to teach scales and chord patterns. She would have the students sit in a row with a scale pattern. They played multiple scales—different keys and modes, depending on grade level and curriculum being used. With the C scale, she would have the students with the C, E, G stand up, and have the students count the interval between them---a wonderful visual of a third!! Then, the E would sit down, they'd count, and there was the fifth! Once the intervals were in place, she taught them how to figure out the I, IV, V chords, then these were used as accompaniment for several songs they sang. I personally used the I, IV, V concept with the singing, and the students did not want to sing with any other accompaniment from then on! Also, this particular teacher taught the students one verse of a piece they were learning to sing to play alone. So, even with a set curriculum of certain pieces to learn, these are easy instruments to add interest to the instruction.

As plans will start soon for the next school year, apply now. The application forms are found on the Area 8 website. The school will also have to furnish proof of insurance. If you have questions, feel free to <u>contact me</u> or your own state representative. Let's spread the joy of ringing to our younger generation!

Class Offerings: Area 8 Festival

Festival attendees are scheduled for four class "sessions" doubled for backto-back repeats, once for Blue, once for Gold. BronzeFest participants will rehearse during class sessions.

(Just some of the) Non-Bell Classes

The difference between a good ringer and a great ringer is a PENCIL!

Learn effective score preparation strategies that you can take back to your choir! Sometimes it's not about what you mark, but how effectively and clearly you mark it. Adopting a universal marking strategy in your choir can make each mark clear for any ringer or any substitute ringer.

Know Thyself!

Learn to use a personality framework called "The Four Tendencies" to know yourself better and to be more productive, effectively develop habits etc. But it can also be helpful to understand the tendency of those around you so that you can effectively communicate with and motivate them.

Resonating Online: Making the Most of Social Media

Beyond Facebook and Twitter! Learn new tactics to get the word out to the world about your awesome handbell program. Bring an internet connected device so you can practice what is preached by our past Area 8 Communications guru!

(Just some of the) Yes-Bell Classes

Beginning Weaving

Tackle those nasty accidentals and multiple-bell passages by learning and mastering the three-bell weave! Bring your gloves, questions about massed and divisional music, and leave with the ability to easily play even the hardest part of any piece in the battery.

Beginning Treble

Learn or re-learn the basics from C6 and up! Gaining confidence with shelley and 4-i-h ringing can enhance your musical result and can make you a more versatile ringer. Arrive with gloves and leave with dazzling treble skill!

Beginning Bass

Learn and master safe techniques for lifting, ringing, damping, and putting down bass handbells. For the purpose of this class, "bass bells" refer to instruments below B3. Bring your gloves and leave with the confidence to sling those buckets!

Ensemble Skills 1

Learn tips and tricks for ringing a full complement of bells with less than a full choir. Ensemble ringing can be a special, difficult, challenging, diverting, and musically satisfying experience. Learn from one who has done and still does ensemble ringing and bring your ideas and questions.

Festival Class Offerings, continued

Bell Trees

Learn techniques for assembling and ringing bell trees. Several musical examples will be shown, and several pieces will be used in demonstration. These will be available for purchase from a vendor following the session.

Stopped Techniques

Pluck, mart, mallet, thumb damp, hand damp? How, why, when, where, and why you should become a master of every stopped sound for handbells as presented by a master teacher.

Repertoire Sessions

Enjoy new masterworks and old favorites for the upcoming season. Music will be available for purchase from a vendor following each session.

Are you attending the Area 8 Festival in Kansas City this summer and want to see a bit of the city before you head back home on Sunday?

Visit Kansas City!

Are you attending the Area 8 Festival in Kansas City this summer and want to see a bit of the city before you head back home on Sunday? Or do you have family visiting the city while you are at the festival? If the name of this year's festival "Kansas City Here I come!" makes you think of the Wilbert Harrison song, "Kansas City", you might try to find the famous 12th and Vine Street mentioned in the song. Unfortunately, nowadays you will only find a park at 12th and Vine, but back in the 1950s, it had jazz clubs, cafes, taverns, honky tonks, and barbecue joints. It was definitely a place to have fun! As a proud resident of this diverse metropolitan area, here are a multitude of ways to spend some time exploring the city:

Restaurants

There are many places to get BBQ in Kansas City and almost all of them are wonderful! Near the "12th and Vine" is Gates Bar-B-Q, located at E. 12th Terrace & Vine Street. Nearby is also the American Jazz Museum at 1616 E. 18th Street which is devoted to jazz music with live performances, educational programs, and interactive exhibits (www.americanjazzmuseum.org). Open on Sundays from 12-5pm.

Baseball

If you are traveling with family and baseball is more their thing, the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum is co-located with the American Jazz Museum with exhibits on this segregated league's 1920 founding through Jackie Robinson's 1947 Brooklyn Dodgers debut (https://www.nlbm.com/). Or if you are interested in taking in a baseball game while you are in town, the Kansas City Royals will be playing the Athletics at 1:10pm (www.MLB.com/royals).

Family Outings

If you want to spend time outside after being inside at the festival, check out Powell Gardens, Kansas City's Botanical Garden, in the southeast portion of the metropolitan area. It features 6,000 varieties of plants, with 225,000 plants in seasonal displays. 1609 NW US Hwy 50, Kingville, MO (https:// powellgardens.org/). If you are more interested in animals, check out the Kansas City Zoo with over 1700 animals on over 200 acres in the middle of the city: 6800 Zoo Drive, Kansas City, MO. Open starting at 9:30am, you can take in one or more of the "continents" and still have time to visit other stops on your list (https://www.kansascityzoo.org/).

Fountains

If you only have a little time, you might try a tour of the fountains that gave Kansas City the name, "City of Fountains!" Grab the KC Streetcar from City Market on the north side to Union Station on the south connecting all the downtown neighborhoods or take a free tour of some of the oldest fountains in the world - some over 300 years old! Just 90 minutes of walking along 15 city blocks. A beautiful way to end your trip to a beautiful city!

Unpublished Music Reading Session

Area 8 Festival/Conference 2022

The Unpublished Music Reading Session will be offered on Friday, June 24, 2022 after the Columbia Handbell Ensemble Concert (10:00 pm or 15 minutes following the dismissal of the concert, whichever is later).

The Unpublished Music Reading Session is an excellent opportunity for any composer or arranger to hear their unpublished manuscript sight-read by a group of handbell enthusiasts who are kind, constructive, and excited about new handbell music.

Composers submitting a piece may request verbal and written feedback from preeminent handbell composers and arrangers John Behnke and Alex Guebert, both who have pieces being performed during the festival. Both are also prolific composers with hundreds of pieces in their respective catalogs.

Registration is open to anyone wishing to share their original composition or arrangement for handbells and/or handchimes that has not been published. *Composers, please register by June 10*

Anyone may ring in the demonstration

choirs or listen in the gallery and need not register in advance. Space at the table to ring in the demonstration choirs will be first come, first served. Multiple sets of handbells and handchimes will be available. Mallets will be provided. Please bring music folders and gloves if you intend to ring.

Composers and arrangers wishing to submit a piece PLEASE register by June 10. Depending on the number of people registering to submit music, registrants may be permitted to bring a second piece to be rung. Composers and arrangers registering will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis with the number of registrants accepted being at the facilitator's discretion. To register to submit a piece, complete the Unpublished Music Reading Session <u>Registration Form</u> and email it to the facilitator (Patrick Gagnon, education.area8@handbellmusicians.org) by June 10th.

Thanks in advance to all of the composers, arrangers, ringers, spectators, equipment suppliers and coordinators whose hard work will be represented at the Unpublished Music Reading Session. The registration is detailed and the rules are firm, but this will help us maximize our time together, giving us the opportunity to read through even more wonderful creations!

Unpublished Music Reading Session Frequently Asked Questions

Q: WHO MAY PARTICIPATE?

A: Anyone may come to ring or listen, with no registration in advance. As for who may register to present a piece, anyone who has something they have written or arranged! (Please include permission to arrange clearances on all copies of arrangements of nonpublic domain pieces.) You don't have to be previously published, write at a certain level, in a certain style, or for a certain number of octaves or ringers.

Q: HOW EXACTLY DO YOU DEFINE "UNPUBLISHED"?

A: If your piece is in print with a publisher or selfpublished for sale, it is *NOT* eligible. If your piece is under contract with a publisher, it is *NOT* eligible. If, however, you have submitted your piece for publication and are awaiting a response or had it rejected at the time of the Unpublished Music Reading Session, you are welcome to present it. If you have not submitted your piece anywhere for publication consideration, it is of course welcome as well!

Q: DO I HAVE TO HAVE THE MUSIC PRINTED ON A COMPUTER?

A: Not at all. If you still write by hand, you are welcome. Just remember that legibility often helps ensure success, especially in a sightreading setting.

Q: HOW DO I SUBMIT MY MANUSCRIPTS?

A: Each composer/arranger is responsible for bringing copies of his/her own pieces. Please make these copies at home and bring them with you; it saves the hassle and expense of finding a copy center at or around the hotel. Bring a copy for yourself (or a guest director, see below) and at least 28 additional copies of each piece, and ***PLEASE HAVE THEM HOLE PUNCHED WITH THE TITLE AND COMPOSER/ARRANGER'S NAME ON EACH PAGE*** Even if your piece is for a smaller number of octaves, at least 28 copies are requested so that even those not ringing may follow along in the score. (While it is not required, having the music run on 11×17 paper and folded in half like a traditional bell folio will be far more manageable than a bunch of single-sided copies.)

Q: I'M NOT A CONDUCTOR, MAY I STILL BRING MY WORK?

A: Of course! If you are a composer/arranger but not a director, we will be happy to conduct the piece for you, or you may bring a friend along to do so.

Q: HOW LONG CAN THE PIECE BE? MAY I WORK ON IT AT ALL?

A: Since time is always a factor, each piece will be given no more than 10 minutes (including setup time). You may use the time as you wish, should you desire to work through a tricky spot or experiment with a different technique somewhere. Remember, everyone is sight-reading, so the piece is unlikely to be "performance ready" during this session. In fairness to other composers, please do not monopolize the session or push the envelope with your time. And if your piece is short and you are happy with it, feel free to end your time early; this will allow us to get through more music.

Q: DO I HAVE TO BE THERE TO HAVE MY PIECE RUNG?

A: Absolutely. Pieces will not be rung with composers/ arrangers in absentia. All composers and arrangers are asked to attend the entirety of the session: leaving after your piece is done is inconsiderate.

Q: MAY I COMPOSE A PIECE WITH EXTRA INSTRUMENTS?

A: Of course you may. You just won't be able to hear those parts unless you provide the instruments and the players.

Q: WHAT IF THERE ARE JUST TOO MANY PIECES TO GET THROUGH?

A: We simply may not get through everything. However, since composers and arrangers must register in advance on a first-come, first-served basis, the cut-off point will be fair. Every registrant is subject to the "as time permits" clause. If, for example, 20 composers register, it is unlikely that all of those composers will be able to present their pieces.

Q: WHAT IF SOMEONE IS LATE, OR DOESN'T SHOW UP?

A: The session will begin at 10:00 pm or 15 minutes following the dismissal of the Columbia Handbell Ensemble Concert, whichever comes later. ANY registrant who is not present at the start of the session will be moved to the end of the list. When his or her work comes up in rotation, it will simply be skipped and returned to at the end, time permitting. To keep things fair and objective, no exceptions will be made, so please don't make us even enact this clause! (Bring your baton, gloves, etc. to the concert on Friday night so you are not caught without them at the last minute.)
