## Festival Classes

## Listed in alphabetical order with class title, teacher, and description

### Bass Bells: Beginning Russell Joy

Get to know the B3 and its buddies. There is a lot to consider before picking up these beasts at the bottom. Body basics, setup, techniques, teamwork, and taking care of equipment will be covered. Bass bell ringers need to be able to prepare and play in ways that serve the music but are safe.

### **Bass Bells: Advanced** Noah Hartsfield

This class will focus on ringing the low bass table of a traditional 5-octave ensemble (C3-C4). The class will explore how to ring quickly and effectively, techniques to aid in ringing, and ways to handle common challenges and difficulties of the low bass table. The class will focus on being hands-on and participants will have an opportunity to tackle difficult passages found in current music.

### **Bell Trees: Beginning** *Pat Latshaw*

If you are interested in adding bell trees to your handbell arsenal, this class will discuss how bell trees can be integrated into your performances, the basic equipment needed, and the introductory skills to start making music with handbell trees.

### **Bells With Other Instruments** Nancy Youngman

The students will be given a list of available music with other instruments, and these will be discussed. A variety of percussion pieces will also be included, and the student will be shown how to use these with their handbell choirs.

### Catch up with that Metronome! Sharon Schmidt

Do fast passages with lots of black on the page challenge you? Learn some tips and tricks for improving your skills to play rapid or rhythmic passages. As a bonus, you'll be improving your sight-reading skills.

### **Grant Writing Basics for Non-Profit Handbell Choirs** Steve Jackson

This session will address the availability of potential grant funds for bell choirs, both on the local and national level. Additionally, local and national foundations have funds available to arts organizations. Accessing these opportunities can enhance budgets and fund projects for your bell choir. If no grant writer is available, we will discuss avenues to identify free or low-cost grant writers.

### Handbells from the Inside Out Nancy Blackwell

This class will use handouts and hands on work with bells to discover how the musician's body is an integral part of playing the instrument of handbells. We will explore breathing and movement techniques to unleash your ensemble's musicianship and visual performance.

### Handbells in Pop Culture Marshall Allen

In recent years handbells have been popping up in a variety of new places. Take a break from ringing and relax in this class while enjoying a compilation of video clips from YouTube and other sources.

### History of Handbells Laurie Austin

The class will explore the origins of handbell ringing in the United States. The discussion will start with the bell bands and troupes that traveled throughout the country in the 19th century, playing for audiences, but not necessarily encouraging participation. It will continue with Margaret Shurcliff, the founder of the New England Guild of English Handbell Ringers, and how her enthusiasm for ringing started a movement across the country. We will also look at other aspects of handbell history, like music notation and publication, and handbell manufacturing.

#### Festival Classes, continued

### Navigating New Music Amy Knudsen

Various processes for sight-reading music will be discussed as well as the pros and cons of each option.

### **Overview of Music Theory** Ron Mallory

Ever wonder why some pieces have lots of sharps and flats, while others have none? Curious about why a composer chooses to write certain notes, and not others? This class will give a broad overview of scales, chords, key signatures, melody, harmony, rhythm, and more, as we take a look "under the hood" of some well-known handbell pieces to see how and why they work. We will also talk about why understanding these concepts is vital in your ensemble's journey to better musicianship.

### Panel: National Events - How to Get Involved Tracy Peterson, Lori Fenton and more

This session will include a panel of handbell musicians who have been involved in many national ringing events. The full realm of national events will be explained and discussed as well as how you can get involved. The panel will also share their personal experience ringing in national events. The session will also include a Q & A segment.

### Practicing Handbells at Home Ron Mallory

You just finished rehearsing with your handbell group  $\dots$  and it will be another full week before you can touch the instrument again, so there is no way to practice on your own. It does not have to be this way! There are many ways handbell musicians can practice at home, even if you do not have your own personal set of bells. This class will be taught from the perspective of both the ringer (tools you can use to practice at home) and the director (resources you can give your ringers to practice from home).

### **Processionals and Ostinatos** Nancy Youngman

Using examples from published sources, the class will practice a variety of processionals and ostinatos, as well as work on their own creation using a variety of ideas. This will be especially helpful with choirs who are working with fewer members or inexperienced ringers.

### Repeatable Changes Sharon Schmidt

How do you play that tricky passage the same way every time? Once you have the basic skills (weaving, table damping, changes to chimes or mallets), the next step is to figure out when to do what, and how to mark your score so that you can repeat the change. In this hand-on class, we will solve multiple problems and explore marking techniques. Bring your mallets.

### **Resources for Handbells in Worship** Beth Ann Edwards

HMA is working on resources for handbells in worship that can be available on the HMA website. This round-table discussion will review resources that are now available and resources that would be helpful and useful if they were available to handbell directors. Participants can ring and work through resources such as descants, singing bells, processionals, etc.

### Ringing 101 Sharon Schmidt

New to handbells? This session will get you started with the basic skills of ringing and damping with proper, healthy technique. It is also a great refresher, or a time for directors to learn how to teach new ringers.

### **Score Marking** *Lori Fenton*

The use of effective and consistent score markings enables handbell ringers to be better prepared from "bells up" to the final cut off. This class will discuss the importance of standard notation for marking bell music as well as offering a review of the standard (and maybe not so standard) notations used.

### **Small Ensemble Techniques: Advanced** *Pat Latshaw*

The standard techniques used with ringing as part of the handbell choir will be expanded upon in this class. Topics covered would include table layout, score notation, sharing bells, bell displacement and recovery, traveling 4-inhand, and learning to dance together. The class will focus on teams of two practicing these techniques, but the skills learned can be applied to small ensembles of any size.

#### **Stem Direction Does Count!** Sharon Schmidt

How do you figure out who does what in handbell music? How would you study a piece of music away from the table? We will walk through several pieces of music to explore the mysteries of stem direction. On the way, we will review all the information presented in the music, including the bells used chart, brackets and parentheses, plus tricks for finding the melody.

### **Stopped Sounds: Beginning** *Nancy Youngman*

Each student will be given a packet of excerpts from music showing a variety of stopped sounds. From instructor explanations and demonstrations, the student will be able to work on perfecting each technique. A fun final exercise will let the students use their skills.

### **Stopped Sounds: Advanced** Pat Latshaw

Prerequisite: Knowledge of basic stopped sound techniques. Briefly review the stopped sound techniques and then put them into practice using examples from published music. Stopped sounds are often used in combination with each other. Learn the art of playing multiple techniques in a piece with emphasis on the preparation needed to play musically.

### Tackling Tricky Terrain: Rhythm Jill Endaya-Allen

With greater understanding of familiar rhythm components, you will encounter fewer rhythms that trick you. This class will include tips for breaking down difficult passages and allow time for hands-on practice.

### Take a Break! Gentle Yoga & Sound Healing Tricia Fuelling/Janelle Flory Schrock

As the Schuyler sisters told Hamilton, "take a break!" In this class we will spend some time stretching all those well used bell ringing muscles through gentle yoga for every level. Take some time to slow down, stretch, and refocus. Exercises will be enhanced by a healing "sound bath" using handbells and other instruments. Everyone is welcome! No need for a yoga mat – just bring yourself!

### **Techniques for Ringers and Directors** *Ron Mallory*

Good technique provides a foundation for good musicianship. This class will explore a "grab-bag" of techniques that are important for both ringers and conductors, including: challenges unique to bass, treble, and battery bells as well as conducting patterns and hand independence, reading ahead, communicating as an ensemble, movement, and eye contact, and more. Along the way ringers and conductors will better understand the other's role in making great music. Aimed at beginning to intermediate ringers and conductors, but with helpful material for more advanced musicians as well.

#### Weaving Lisa Mills

Does playing three notes in a row kind of stress you out? How about four? And what about those accidentals? This class will give you confidence about playing those types of passages in your music. Weaving is a skill needed by all ringers so let's learn the proper technique to make your ringing look graceful.

### You've Just Heard the "M" Word. Now What? - Memorization Tracy Peterson

Wait, what? You want me to memorize? This session will explore the use of memorization for the handbell musician. We will discuss strategies and tools for memorization and experience the process of memorizing to be able to ring a few short excerpts by the end of the session. Attendees need to bring a standup binder and the music for the massed ringing track.

## Festival Clinicians

Stevie Berryman and Greig Ashurst will be splitting all the conducting duties so that each ringing division will get to experience the expertise and the passion of both conductors.

Stevie Berryman can't whistle. But she makes fantastic pesto, and she can fold a fitted sheet. Likewise, her skills as music director and teacher have also been acquired through long hours of arduous and dedicated practice. For much of her career Stevie has directed seven or more ensembles each week, meaning she has 114 years of experience (in dog years). Her effusive energy and wild creativity found a perfect setting in 2013 when she became the Artistic Director of the Houston Chamber Ringers, which has let her smash together her love for music, laughter, and tacos in a truly remarkable way. She has a particular passion for teaching beginners how to ring, and her innovative, play-based methods have made her a sought-after educator and clinician at area and national handbell festivals. Stevie serves as the handbell director at First Congregational Church Houston, and loves helping other choirs as a private clinician or planning epic concerts for them as a creative consultant. She and her husband Paul are co-owners of Truly Horrible Things, a snarky card game company, even though her mother always told her that no one would ever pay her to be sarcastic.

For over thirty years, **Greig Ashurst** has developed an impressive conducting and teaching career in many facets of music, technology, and educational philosophy across the United States. A native of Lafayette, Louisiana, he served as a music educator in Louisiana, North Carolina, and Texas. Currently, Mr. Ashurst is director of bands and director of technology at Cathedral-Carmel School, where he was selected as the 2016-2017 Teacher of the Year, an honor for which he was selected twice previously in Louisiana and North Carolina. He is a published composer and arranger and has two lines of mallets that he designed specifically for playing on handbells. These mallets, sold by Schulmerich Bells, have changed the timbral landscape of handbell music throughout the world. He currently serves as president of the Handbell Musicians of America and is an advocate for getting handbells into schools throughout the United States.

## Friday Evening Concert: River City Ringers of Omaha, Nebraska

River City Ringers of Omaha are a dedicated group of ringers who provide cultural enrichment by ringing music. The group provides a focused opportunity to present a wide range of sacred, secular and original handbell music through concerts and educational programs. The choir cooperates with the national community and professional handbell ensemble movement in raising the awareness and standards of English handbell ringing locally, regionally and nationally. They also assist in developing diverse ringing opportunities for those who ring handbells in the Omaha Metro area and foster fun and fellowship.

The choir musicians have been involved in the art of handbell ringing for many years. We are a non-profit 501(c) 3 organization dedicated to fostering public



interest in the art of handbell ringing. The choirs ring with a five octave set of Schulmerich handbells, a five-octave set of Malmark Choirchimes, and a five octave set of Malmark bells.

Since 1988, the choir has rung for events in the Omaha Metropolitan area including concerts at the Holland Performing Arts Center, Durham Western Heritage Museum, Lauritzen Gardens, and Omaha Royals. The choir offers seasonal and spring concerts, with musical selections that include classical or contemporary, serious or zany, formal or casual, and sacred or secular.

## Saturday Noon-time Concert: Rezound! of Kansas City, Missouri

Rezound! is dedicated to promoting the art and skill of handbell ringing in performance, serving the community through varied educational endeavors, and providing the highest quality and challenging outlet for skilled ringers.

Established in June 2001, the ensemble presents a lively sound blending the unique timbres of Schulmerich handbells, Petit & Fritsen bells, Malmark Choirchimes, Whitechapel bells and Maas-Rowe bells.

Rezound! has been creating and performing exceptional music since 2001. While our passion for handbell music is what connects us, our membership includes individuals with diverse interests and occupations: scientists,



teachers, accountants, stained glass artist, landscape architect/urban designer, sign language interpreter, audiovisual archivist, individuals working at banks and universities as well as church musicians. We call the greater Kansas City area home, with members from Missouri and Kansas.

# Chime Loan Program

Educators: Do we ever have a deal for you!! FREE!!!

For one year, you will have the use of a 3-octave set of Malmark hand chimes. How can you beat that? Well, we DO beat that!! Besides the use of the chimes, you will get a set of materials to help with your planning and ideas, along with a year's membership to the Handbell Musicians of America. This is an offer that is valid in every state!

I had the opportunity to use the chimes twice in my career. Once it was for a 6th Grade specials class. The focus was on singing and basic theory, and the chimes were instrumental (pun intended!) in teaching both. I started with chord progressions, then we applied those to the vocal music in the curriculum, then the students progressed to ringing and singing at the same time. It was so successful that the principal decided to buy a set of chimes for constant use in the school. And, several of those students became interested in playing with their church choirs.

When I taught middle school band, I augmented some of the pieces with the chimes. If you've ever taught Middle School, you know that the percussionists MUST be kept busy. These were perfect for them, as they are percussion instruments. They were great for teaching note reading to the young drummers, plus added interest to the pieces. Probably the one they liked the best was using them in a concert with the melody of *Carol* of the Bells. I had three students playing them front and center, and they absolutely loved it.

Now is the time to be preparing for the fall semester. The application forms are found on our website: Area 8 Handbell Musicians of America. You can either go to the Chime Loan Program, which is under "Resources" or to the site for the state where you reside. Each state has a Chimes Chair, so you can contact them or me. This is a decision that will greatly create interest in your lessons. So, do it now as you're thinking about your curriculum for the coming year!

Undoubtedly there are many more pieces that would be appropriate. If the deceased person is a former choir member, they may have a favorite piece that is already in the choir's repertoire. In addition, anything contemplative, solemn, or even sometimes joyful might be appropriate.

## Handbells and Funerals

I had the privilege of participating in a handbell choir at my old church in Nebraska, playing during the funeral of a beloved long-time member of the group. Occasionally, handbell directors are asked to provide a choir to ring at the funeral of a recently departed ringer or another church member who loved handbells. This task can be quite challenging due to the limited time to prepare, and because the choir must be assembled from available ringers because of schedule conflicts. The difficulty lies in finding something meaningful that can be easily prepared at short notice, often by a shorthanded choir.

Yet for all the difficulties involved, the presence of handbells at a funeral can evoke poignant emotions for everyone involved. For example, the family of one elderly ringer asked that her former choir perform, leaving her position open except for some flowers where she used to stand. The symbolism of this was very beautiful and moving, not only for the attendees at her funeral but especially for her fellow ringers.

Here are some pieces of music that might be suitable for such occasions (with thanks to Nancy Youngman for her help compiling this list):

- 1. I'll Fly Away (arr. Waldrop, Level 2+, 3-5 octaves): A joyful and uplifting piece that celebrates the idea of eternal life and freedom.
- 2. Every Time I Feel the Spirit (arr. Linker/McFadden, Level 4-, 3-5 octaves with keyboard): A spirited arrangement that reflects hope and spiritual renewal.
- 3. Give Me Jesus (arr. Waldrop, Level 2+, 3-5 octaves, with vocal solo): A simple yet profound hymn expressing a deep longing for a personal connection with God.
- 4. In the Garden (arr. Dobrinski, Level 2, 3-5 octaves): A peaceful and reflective piece that speaks of finding solace in communion with the Divine.
- 5. It is Well with My Soul (arr. Moklebust, Level 3, 3-5 octaves, with flute or violin): A classic hymn that conveys trust and peace even in the face of adversity.
- 6. Just a Closer Walk with Thee (arr. Greer, Level 3, 3-5 octaves, with jazz clarinet): A soulful arrangement that invites listeners to draw closer to their faith.
- 7. The Lord's Prayer (arr. Dobrinski, NR, 3-5 octaves): A timeless prayer set to music, offering comfort and reassurance.
- 8. When the Saints Go Marching In (arr. Helman, Level 4, 3-5 octaves): A celebratory tune that celebrates the journey to heaven.
- 9. As the Deer (arr. Geschke, Level 2+, 3-5 octaves): A gentle and contemplative piece inspired by Psalm 42.
- 10. Amazing Grace: There are various arrangements of this beloved hymn, each capturing the grace and hope found in redemption.

# Connect, Create, Celebrate: A Spiritual Journey in Ringing



The first Area 8 Handbell Festival I attended was in Topeka in June 2010. (How could that have been fourteen years ago?) Family circumstances necessitated that I take the family dog with me to Topeka where a friend took Jett to a farm for a few days. Jett JoJo Jensen, a Schnauzer, was one of the coolest and smartest dogs I ever knew, and I know he looked forward to spending a couple of weeks exploring the farm he was very familiar with.

On the other hand, I was unfamiliar with attending large handbell festivals. Topeka was somewhat familiar, but not in a comfortable manner. My hotel check-in went smoothly, and the presence of unfamiliar people (many wearing matching shirts!) informed me that the festival would be a vibrant event. As a novice not paying attention to pre-registration information, I was thankful for an on-the-spot opportunity to play in the select Festival Ringers—especially since I had already purchased the music. Placement auditions for the Festival Ringers surprised me, but what a thrill to play in an advanced group of ringers! And then came the mass ringing sessions in the Kansas Expocentre. Previously, I had rung in groups of maybe eighty ringers, but nothing like 300! The sound was glorious, especially when notes, rhythms, and tempi came together. As an "orphan ringer," I was welcomed by ringers from Omaha, all of whom I still Connect with at times...and probably will this June in Columbia, MO.

Personally, the results of attending my first Handbell Festival were significant:

- 1. Joining the Nebraska Handbell Committee.
- 2. Meeting and making new friends.
- 3. Unintended conducting lessons from playing in the Festival Ringers that impacted my own interpretation of music and conducting gestures.
- 4. Connecting with composers/arrangers and ringers.
- 5. I don't recall who the teacher/composer was for a session on writing for handbells, but she planted an important lesson: "Everyone has a song to be written." I took that to heart to Create a handbell arrangement of a piece I composed in fourth grade.
- 6. And finally, coming home with more than a half-dozen new titles to share with my church and college handbell choirs. It was like I had already done the score study and was ready to go when September arrived.



Spiritual Journey, continued

Fourteen years later and I am attending "Connect, Create, Celebrate"—the Area 8 Handbell Festival in Columbia, Missouri. My role is different as I join my Area 8 colleagues who serve on the Board. Our collective energies will schlep tables and instruments, set up classrooms and rehearsal spaces, organize check-in and registration services, make new acquaintances, greet old friends, and assure that we all Celebrate the art of handbells throughout the festival. My handbell career has always had a "spiritual flow" as an educator, conductor, committee member, and now an Area 8 Board member. Together—meaning the totality of everyone involved, we will all rejoice in having a successful and educational Festival experience in June 2024!

Please join us in Columbia from June 20th to 22nd for "Connect, Create, Celebrate". If you're an "orphan ringer," you will be welcomed. If you do not have a full ensemble, you will be welcomed. Join us to find inspiration in our featured conductors, classroom instructors, professional ensembles, and incredible music.
