We **CELEBRATED** the small wins and the big wins. We learned new skills and concepts at classes. We rang some challenging music together on the ringing floor.

These few days of CONNECTING, CREATING, and CELEBRATING didn't just happen by themselves, though. It's been a two-year process with a very experienced and committed Area 8 Board.

As Area 8 chair, I want to express my thanks to our board for working so tirelessly from Wednesday night through Sunday afternoon. Many on the board have helped with Area 8 Festivals in the past and know what needs to happen, often without asking. Those who are new to the Area 8 board jumped right in with contributions of their own as well. Our local folks, Noah Hartsfield and Nancy Dreier, had the enormous job of securing the loaned equipment and keeping it all organized while in the hotel. They did super! In multiple trips with a U-haul truck, they moved:

- 13 sets of 3-octave bells
- 3 sets of 5-octave bells
- 3 sets of upper 4/5-octave bells
- 4 sets of lower 4/5-octave bells
- 1 set of 5-octave chimes
- 18 extra tables
- LOTS of foam pads

Board members also brought 5 whiteboards, 3 projectors, two sets of speakers, and a printer!

I look forward to this fall when I rotate to past chair, working with Lori and the 2024-2026 Board on future events and helping the Illinois committee as co-chair.

This year was my first handbell festival, and it was extremely fun! I took weaving, music theory, techniques for ringers and conductors, and History of Handbells. I learned the most about music theory, but also a lot about the history of handbells. While I knew a lot about ringer techniques and weaving, they were still fun classes to go to!

I rang in Gold division, and mass ringing. My favorite song to play was definitely Eternity's Timepiece. I loved all the jokes both conductors told. This was the first time I really played bass bells, as I'm usually battery or high treble, so I will definitely apply myself to bass bell ringing. Even though I didn't take the class on bass bells, this helped me to get more of a feel for them.

I was really excited to meet all the conductors who had written some of the music we were playing, or I had played in the past; Ron Mallory, Stevie Berryman, and Greig Ashurst, as it's not often that you get that opportunity! I could easily follow along with their conducting and didn't get lost too often. My favorite piece of advice was when Stevie said if you can't pay attention to your markings in your music, you can write a swear word around it. I also liked watching other professional groups that I wouldn't usually see like Rezound! and River City Ringers. I also enjoyed watching my Mom play in BronzeFest.

I'm definitely going to take a lot of this knowledge back to my home group; Bells In Motion, for its next season! Overall, I'm really glad I got to go, and hopefully can come next time!

As a first-time festival attendee, I didn't know what to expect, but my expectations were greatly exceeded. Wow! The massed bell ringing with nearly 200 ringers was incredible. The massed ringers were broken out into beginning and intermediate groups to work on separate music geared to their ringing level, which was also performed at the final concert. The guest conductors challenged all ringers to improve in 8 short sessions while intertwining standup comedy – I've never laughed so much at a bell rehearsal. In between ringing rehearsals, there were dozens of breakout sessions geared to all levels of ringers; if you didn't find at least 3 that would help you improve your ringing, you didn't try very hard. This conference helped all ringers improve and showed the possibility of advanced bell ringing with conference-put-together groups like BronzeFest and Showcase, or city groups like Omaha's River City Ringers or Kansas City's Rezound! Hearing handbell groups play advanced music demonstrates what is possible for your ringing. Hearing handbell groups play Star Wars as Darth Vader challenges the director to a light saber joust, Beach Boys with beach balls batted through the audience, or seeing wild animals roam the stage, opens up your ringing to so many more possibilities. If you have never attended a festival before, I would highly recommend it – you will not go home disappointed.




Highlights From Area 8 Festival Connect, Create, Celebrate

A Committee Member's Perspective

Area 8 Festival: Connect, Create, Celebrate Byron W. Jensen, Nebraska Chair

It is now the beginning of July 2024. The Area 8 Festival has come and gone. Thousands of conversations and connections were made. My question is: What did you take away from this year's Festival? For me, it was an appreciation for the Area 8 Committee.

This was not my first rodeo for Area 8 Festivals, but it was the first time I had an inside view as a committee member. I have assisted in a half-dozen multi-day conferences in my professional musical life. To martellato another phrase (so to speak), "it takes a village" to organize such events. Admittedly, I don't feel that I contributed much, but as a first-time committee member, I observed some amazing work behind the scenes.

The Area 8 Committee performed like a well-adjusted clapper. This was due to an Executive Committee who started planning months in advance; this included innumerable conversations and visits with representatives at the conference hotel. One of the hardest aspects for any type of conference is negotiating a price that assures a break-even point for Area 8's expenses


(with hopes of putting some money into the reserves), and a profit for the hotel. Beyond such financial negotiations is determining what rooms are available, meals, and assigning board members to specific duties. Because of the Executive Committee's preparedness, the rest of us pretty much knew what to do. Two other points:

... a request: Please become involved with your State's handbell committee...

- 1) I thought the Holiday Inn Executive Center was comfortable, and the staff was very accommodating throughout our festival; and
- 2) the Committee used WhatsApp to keep connected. I would estimate we had over 500 text messages during the festival.

Events ranging from classes to reading sessions to special concerts to the silent auction required numerous people to organize. We had a registrar to track classes for participants; a communications guru to keep everyone informed; and an education director to schedule educators and rooms. Quite honestly, I never saw a blip as the festival ran its course over three days. Such is the beauty of pre-planning: once it starts, it runs on its own.

Most may not realize it, but in the background were equipment managers

who picked up borrowed sets and returned them to multiple churches in Columbia and the surrounding area. Some committee members also brought their own instruments and the equipment necessary for classrooms. A potential nightmare looms after a festival ends and borrowed sets (which could include foam, mallets, tables and stands) are kept separate and returned home.

The Area 8 Festival was successful and enjoyable because so many contributed their time, muscles, and energy to set the stage. We also had two excellent clinicians who led with clarity, wit, and musicality; two amazing guest groups; and two vendors. It was fantastic to see teenagers and younger adults participating alongside older adults. It was great to catch up with folks I have not seen for a couple of years or have only seen virtually. And yes, it was nice to get back home.

Now, as July 2024 opens, it is time to plan a new "semester" of church music. I commented in my previous Quavers article that attending handbell festivals or workshops always supplies me with new selections for my groups. I came home with a handful of titles to further review and determine if they will support our pastor's planned liturgy—or more importantly, are approachable by my groups. As I do this, I will fondly recall my time in Columbia, listening to stories and laughter, and the beautiful sound of handbell music.

Before I conclude, a request: Please become involved with your State's handbell committee, help grow our numbers, and be supportive of other handbell groups in your nearby community.
